Minutes FROM THE 80TH ANNUAL MEETING

April 3, 2018 at 7:00 p.m • Corydon Central High School Gymnasium • Corydon, IN

The meeting was called to order on Tuesday,

April 3, 2018, at 7:00 p.m. following the National Anthem performed by Corydon Live. Deacon John Jacobi from St. Bernard's Catholic Church provided the invocation.

President Book welcomed everyone in attendance and thanked them for coming. He then introduced the REMC Board of Directors.

Secretary-Treasurer David Poe reported that a notice of the Annual Meeting was mailed to each member of the cooperative as shown on the co-ons records. He reported the REMC by-laws requires 2% of members be present to conduct husiness. Mr. Poe acknowledged there were more than the required members present tonight. 720 members were present.

President Book asked if there were any objections to the acceptance of the 2017 Annual Meeting Minutes as printed on the back page of the program. There were no objections and the minutes were approved. Mr. Book then introduced corporate attorney,

Mr. Colin informed the membership that the REMC is guided in the conduct of its corporate affairs by the Indiana REMC Act, the Cooperative's Articles of Incorporation and the Bylaws of the cooperative. This year directors from Districts 1, 8, and 9 were up for election for three-year terms. To be eligible for membership on the Board of Directors, a candidate must have been a bona fide resident of the district in which he or she stands for election and must remain a resident of that district during his or her term.

Attorney Colin then described the appointment of the Credentials & Election Committee and introduced said members. Mr. Colin then introduced the candidates:

- District #1 is David Poe
- · District #8 is Danny Wiseman
- District #9 is Roy Zimmerman

There were no petitions received to oppose the incumbents for District 1, 8, and 9. Since there were no candidates in opposition, Mr. Colin asked if there were any objections from the membership to approve the candidates by acclamation. Since there was no opposition to voting by acclamation, all of the members in favor of electing the candidates signified by saying aye. The candidates were then hereby

David Poe introduced Joe Boesing, partner with Monroe Shine & Company, Inc., who presented the Financial Report.

After the Financial Report concluded, President Book asked that the Treasurer's report be accepted as printed in tonight's annual meeting program, unless there was an objection from the floor. No objections were made so the Treasurer's report was accepted. President Book then introduced David Lett. Manager to deliver the Manager's report.

Mr. Lett, thanked everyone for attending the 80th Annual Meeting celebration and recognized those members over 90 years of age. Mr. Lett discussed some of the changes over the last 80 years. He then showed a video that looked back at some of the history of the Rural Electric Industry and some of the things going on today.

Manager Lett gave an overview of the evolution of the 80th Anniversary Book. He then recognized those members who contributed to the history of the book, followed by a brief history of Harrison REMC detailing all the major milestones along the way; first Board of Directors, first pole set, first manager, etc.

The retired employees for 2017 were recognized for their years of service to the cooperative. Gary Eiler retired with over 44 years of service, Jeanne Melton over 43 years of service, and Debbie Koenig over 24 years of service

Mr. Lett presented statistics on the number of members, costs of kWh, average household income, gasoline, new home prices, and a gallon of milk throughout the years beginning

Mr. Lett reported that Harrison REMC has returned over \$4 million to the member owners, and this year, the REMC is planning to return over \$1.2 million in capital credits to former members and estates. Since the REMC was incorporated, over \$6.6 million has been returned to members. He also spoke about rolling out a new meter system to replace the existing system that is 13 years old and is now too costly to maintain.

In conclusion, Mr. Lett. thanked the members and expressed his hopefulness that we will be here another 80 years, to serve the electric needs of this wonderful area that we call home!

At 7:33 p.m. President Book gave his closing remarks and asked if there was any unfinished business or new business. There being none, the meeting adjourned at 7:34 p.m. Mr. Geswein then came to the podium to draw for Door Prizes. The event concluded at 8:07 n.m.








